

# RELATIONSHIPS AND HEALTH EDUCATION SURVEY 2020

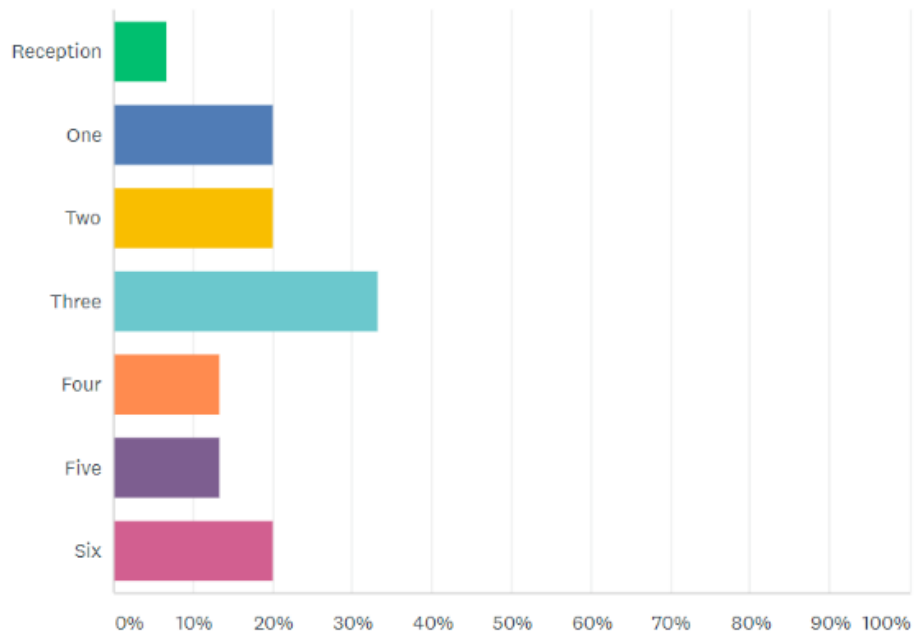

<b>Context:</b>	<p>In 2020, the school reviewed its Relationships and Health Education curriculum including sexual health.</p> <p>As part of the process the views of parents and children was considered important.</p> <p>The draft proposed curriculum was shared with parents to review.</p> <p>The parent body were asked to contribute to an online survey.</p> <p>Response rate – 8%</p>
<b>Areas of Strength:</b>	<p>The proposed curriculum was considered appropriate and met the needs of children and parents.</p> <p>The vast majority of parents felt that there were no gaps or areas of improvement in the proposed curriculum.</p>
<b>Areas of Consideration for the Senior Leadership Team:</b>	<p>Communication with parents regarding the content of the whole curriculum for RHE</p>
<b>Next Steps:</b>	<p>Sharing of report with school community including staff, governors and parents</p> <p>Meeting of the Senior Leadership Team to discuss and address the areas highlighted</p> <p>Implementation of the curriculum from September 2021</p>

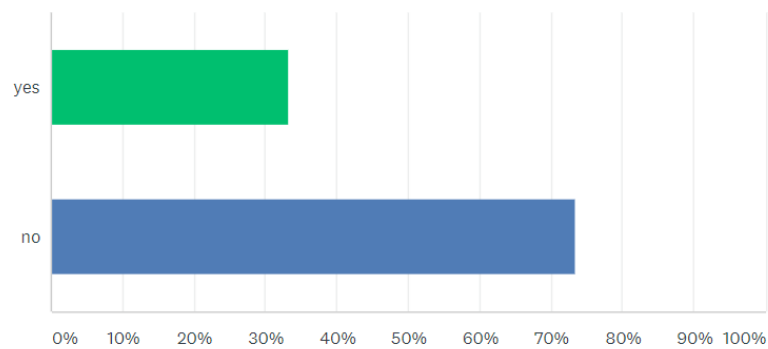
# What year group is your child(ren) currently in?

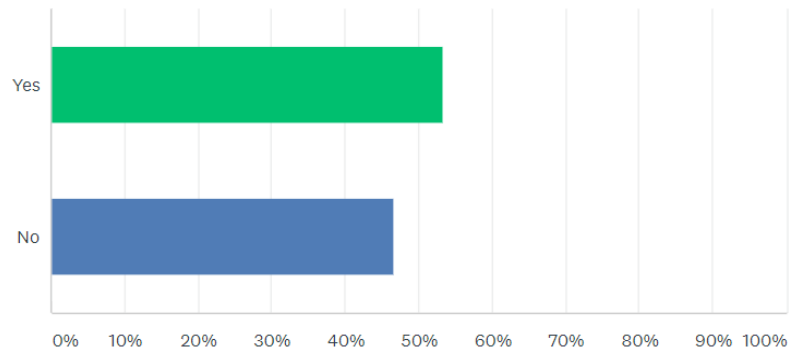

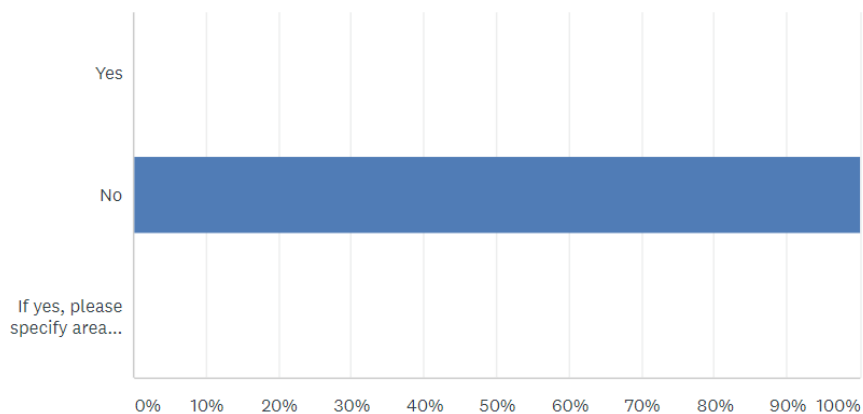
